SDG-8: Decent Work and Economic Growth

Women must have equal access to decent work, productive resources and financial services and equal voice in economic decision, equal pay for equal work, better access to employment opportunity, safety at work place. SDG-9: Industry Innovation and Infrastructures

Economy builds on infrastructure which needs to be sustainable. All elements of planning, building and financing must take gender dimensions into account so that women have facilities and services essential to their needs and rights.

SDG-10: Reduced Inequalities

Many inequalities have widened across societies. Gender discrimination makes women prove to deeper disparities. Gender discrimination can intersect with other types eg. age, ethnicity, disability, economic status etc. multiplying the burden of equality many times. Therefore advocacy

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for decent work, social protection, gender sensitive economic policies around the world. It is mandatory to focus on empowering women and reduce gender inequality in all sphere.

SDG-11: Sustainable Cities and Communities

Cities and human settlement should be inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable. By making cities and human settlement inclusive we can make it prosperous, safe, equitable and pleasant. Women should be given equal roles in making decision in the urban world.

SDG-12: Responsible Consumption and Production

SDG-13: Climate Action

Climate change poses growing risk. Women can offer valuable insight into better managing the effect of climate change and its risks. they should be given right to all capacities needed to protect themselves and to participate in decisions with profound implications for people and planet.

SDG-14: Life Below Water

Women are largely concentrated in low skilled, low paid jobs with irregular seasonal employment in processing, packaging and marketing. Work without contracts or health safety and labour rights protection. They face risk of ocean degradation, Women's limited representation in marine science must be corrected towards tapping all perspective for fair and durable solutions.

SDG-15: Women and indigenous women in particular, need to be included in decision making on ecosystem use at all levels, as essential players in preserving our planet.

SDG-16: Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions

Promotion of peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, provide access to justice for all and build effective, accountable and inclusive institution at all levels. Protection of women's right without exception peaceful, all inclusive society. Engaging women in all aspects of peace negotiation, peace building and reconstruction of all inclusive society.

SDG-17: Partnership for the Goals

SDGs will mean little without means to implement them. Gender equality is central to all SDGs. Women should have right to equal access and benefit from each of means of implementation. They need to lead decision making in all fields. They should have access to technologies, gender responsive budgeting, and provision of women's right.

Links of SDG-5 with other SDGs

The 17 SDGs or global goals are interlinked and addressed multidimensionally. SDG-5 although is a stand alone goal, other SDGs and targets can not be achieved without progress of SDG-5. The link between SDG-5and other SDGs are extensive.

Decent work and regular income for women directly contribute to poverty reduction (SDG-1) and also support better education (SDG-4) that is equality and quality education educated family and better socio-economic status. Zero hunger, food security and nutrition and women's contribution in this field (SDG-2) are closely linked with SDG-5. Eliminating all forms of violence against women and girls (Target 5.2) is critical to healthy lives and well being for people of all ages SDG-3 and

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SDG-6. Therefore we can say that gender equality and women empowerment is cross cutting theme for achievement of all SDGs.

SDGs and Environment: Analysis of the Role of Women Empowerment

The SDGs are closely interlinked goals that also focus on sustainable protection of environment at all levels. They are determined to protect the planet from degradation, including through sustainable consumption and production, sustainably managing its natural resources and taking urgent action on climate changes. SDGs with environment theme are SDGs 8.4, SDG-11, SDG-12, SDG-13, SDG-14, SDG-15.

SDG-15: Protect restore and promote sustainable use of terrestrial ecosystem, sustainable manage forests, combat desertification and halt and reverse land degradation and halt biodiversity loss is directly related to environmental safeguard.

SDG-5: Which focuses on gender equality and women's empowerment is a significant contributor in all the SDGs related to environment.

The nature and women both have been subjected to subjugation and oppression by the hands of patriarchal society. Over exploitation rather than sustained utilization of resources like land, water and fuel have resulted in degradation of resources. Women have direct contact with natural resources eg. fodder, fuel, forest, water and land specially in developing countries. Specially in rural areas, being the supplier of water, fuel supplies, medicinal plants at home, women are more sensitive to rampant deforestation, land degradation and soil depletion, difficult access to land and forest. It makes their access difficult further, resulting in their deprivation. They are also very close to nature and therefore major contributors in environmental rehabilitation and conservation with high ecological conciousness (Movements eg. Chipko 1973, Appiko (1983) Silent-Valley 1976, Narmada Bachao Andolan (1989), Navdanya Movement (1984), Amrita Devi, Gaura Dev, Sunita Narayan, Medha Patkar, Vandana Shiva, Green Belt Movement, Rachel Carson, Wangari Maathai, May Boeve, Marina Silva).

Empowered women are essential for any measure aimed at environmental protection and sustainable development. Gender equality and women's empowerment (SDG-5) contributes towards sustainable and balanced environment. SDG-15 is key to food and water security (SDG 2 and 6), health and well being (SDG-3) and provision of affordable energy (SDG-7). Empowerment women can be agent of change, leading biodiversity protection, conservation and sustainable farming efforts.

Economic and Social Development and Women's Empowerment

Women who make up half of world's popular their empowerment benefits the society enormously in its social and economic development.
